Position Summary

The Arts Faculty is accepting applications from suitably qualified candidates to teach into the Skills Program of the first-year Arts Foundation (AF) subjects.

The skills component of the AF subjects is designed to introduce students to the essentials of analysis and communication employed in the Humanities and Social sciences. The overall aim of the Skills Program is to explicitly specify the core skills students will need for the successful undertaking of their Bachelor of Arts, to actively assist students to acquire these skills, and to highlight the efficacy of these skills in their future endeavours.

Skills workshops run in Weeks 1-9 of the semester. Workshops are allocated based on individual tutor availability during normal teaching hours, therefore we cannot guarantee that all tutors will have classes for the full 9 weeks.

Tutors will be required to attend:

- A Skills Tutor Training session which will take place prior to the commencement of teaching;
- Attend a one-hour post-workshop review meeting; and
- Meetings or training as required throughout the semester.

If you are new to the Faculty, you will be required to attend the Faculty Sessional Academic induction and training.

1. Key Responsibilities

1.1 SESSIONAL TUTOR - GENERAL

- Conduct Skills Workshops in the required mode (eg. online, classroom, blended) to the standard of the Faculty of Arts. This may include preparing a brief lesson plan for each lab, and facilitating informed group discussions.
- Prepare class materials in accordance the guidelines and materials provided and under the guidance of the AF Skills Coordinator;
- Consultation with students in relation to weekly topics and skills development, which is contemporaneous and part of the derived teaching rate
- Attend meetings with the AF Skills Coordinator as required;
- Undertake other appropriate academic and administrative duties as directed, including keeping an accurate record of student attendance in each class and considering matters in relation to student absence.
- Participate in professional development activities organised by the Faculty.

1.2 OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY (OH&S)

2. Selection Criteria

2.1 ESSENTIAL

- Minimum of a Bachelor of Arts degree (or equivalent)
- Experience in online teaching delivery facilitated through video conferencing software (e.g. Canvas LMS, Zoom)
- Teaching experience at tertiary level
- Knowledge and understanding of the subject-matter
- Excellent organisational, presentation and communication skills
- Must be able to demonstrate proof of a valid entitlement to be able to work in Australia
- Ability to commit to a minimum number of work hours as required by the Program Co-ordinator

2.2 DESIRABLE

- Experience with using University of Melbourne IT systems including Themis and LMS.
- Honours level or higher postgraduate qualifications

3. Special Requirements

- Applicants who are enrolled as PhD or Masters students must have been confirmed in their candidature and not be past 3.5 years (PhD) and 1.5 years (MA) full-time equivalency.
- Currently enrolled RHD students at the University of Melbourne applying to become a Tutor must have the support of their supervisor.
- All Faculty of Arts staff may be directed to perform work duties remotely and/or on-campus for a specified period of time.
- Tutors are expected to create a University staff email account through the University's Identity Management system. All correspondence relating to their employment must be sent and received through their staff e-mail account.
- A current Working with Children Check is required as a pre-requisite to employment.
