

Enrolment Requirements


Domestic students:

Enrol in at least one subject each half-year period

International student visa holders:

Full-time study load at least 50 credit points each half-year period


- ✓ Make sure you have fully enrolled for Semester 2 via your Study Plan in my.unimelb
- **✓** Re-enrolment for next year opens in November





Enrolment key dates

- Be aware of standard and non-standard study period dates
- The Last date to self-enrol is the final date you can enrol in a new subject or <u>swap subjects</u>
- The Census date is the last date you can withdraw from a subject without penalty. After the census date you are liable for the subject fees, and it will be recorded on your academic transcript
- The Last date to withdraw without fail is the final date you can withdraw from a subject without receiving a grade on your academic transcript
- Always check the Handbook for each subject


The Handbook

Choosing your major



How to enrol in your Study Plan

- My.unimelb.edu.au Student portal
- Your study plan groups subjects according to subject types,
 e.g., foundation, elective or specialisation subjects
- You may need to select 'choose' to browse and add subjects or sections to your plan
- Subjects showing in yellow are planned
- Subjects change to green once enrolled
- You can self-manage most subject changes but check your key dates!



Enrol in your 'Planned' subjects

- 1. Select the study period option from the dropdown menu next to the subject, if applicable.
- 2. Tick the 'Enrol' box on the right-hand side of the subject.
- 3. Scroll to the bottom of the Study Plan and click the button to 'continue to enrol'.




Enrolment Assistance

You can submit an Enrolment Assistance Form to:

- Change your specialisation or major
- Move subjects on your study plan
- Add a subject that is in the Handbook for your course
- Take a subject not in the Handbook for your course
- Waive a prerequisite
- Add approved advanced standing to your study plan
- Apply to overload
- Enrol after the last self-enrol date







Timetable and LMS





Class Timetable

- Refer to Class timetable step-by-step instructions
- Check the opening and closing dates
- Up to 24 hour delay after enrolling in subjects
- Check Timetable Help for troubleshooting
- If you can't resolve an issue during the review and adjust period, submit a *Timetabling Assistance* Form (TAF) - assessed by your faculty






Learning Management Systems (LMS)







Conferences are an amazing way to:

- Engage with established academics and emergent researchers in your field
- Raise the profile of your own research in the discipline
- Put presentation skills into practice and gain confidence
- Access opportunities to publish

The Faculty of Arts supports coursework students to attend conferences which are relevant to their program of study and to which they've been invited to attend or participate.

- Grants are awarded at the rate of 50% of documented travel and registration costs, up to a maximum value of \$500 for local conferences, \$1000 for interstate conferences, and \$2000 for international conferences.




Scholarships

What is Experiential Learning?

Experiential Learning (EL)

integrates your academic learning with its practical application in the workplace and in community, it is multi-sited learning (Schubert).

INDUSTRY PROJECTS

 Team projects based at the University where you work with an industry partner to deliver a specific project or solve an industry problem, with co-supervision by an academic.

INTERNSHIPS / WORK PLACEMENTS

- An internship can be a capstone experience of your graduate education.
- It is a bridge between tertiary education and paid employment that prepares you for professional practice.
- The main purpose of an internship should be to provide experience to the student under the guidance of a senior staff at the host organisation.

SOCIAL IMPACT PROJECT

 Cocurricular project to start a social enterprise.

SOCIAL ENTERPRISE INCUBATOR

- Components of coursework or cocurricular activity within your degree that teaches professional skills, combining business with social purpose.
- Develop and pitch a social enterprise to address needs in a particular community or group.
